In our community, of course, although individuals take time off, the work of the Jewish Federation of St. Louis and all our community organizations continues.

Our Jewish Federation of St. Louis Board recently approved the recommendation of our Planning and Allocations Committee to allocate more than \$8.5 million to our community agencies as well as programs we support in Israel, and other areas of the world where Jewish people need our help. Many thanks to Sue Schlichter, our Vice Chair of Planning and Allocations, and a dedicated group of lay leaders who devoted countless hours to this process.

The first building in the new Covenant Place was dedicated on June 21, and the residents began moving in early in July. Congratulations to the Covenant Place Board, and CEO Joan Dennison. The capital campaign had broad support from our community, and the Jewish Federation of St. Louis played an important role with many donors to share the importance of this residential development for our seniors.

Beginning July 31, our community will host approximately 1,300 Jewish teenage athletes from across the globe for the JCC Maccabi Games. The Games are a celebration of our entire community where we come together to strengthen our identity, engage all of Jewish St. Louis, and build a foundation for continued partnership and sustainability. I encourage you to get involved by volunteering, if possible, or attending opening ceremonies and cheering on the athletes.

On September 1, the Jewish Federation of St. Louis' Annual Meeting will take place at a venue many of you have visited over the years – Busch Stadium in downtown St. Louis. Beginning at 5:00 pm, there will be elections, presentation of awards, and a guest speaker, former major leaguer Adam Greenberg. And the 2016 Annual Campaign will kick off after the Annual Meeting. If you desire, you will have a chance to make your pledge to the campaign. Following the success of last year's Annual Meeting and Get in the Olive Groove, we welcome families to join us this year at Busch Stadium. Additionally, September 6 marks the deadline for early-bird pricing on our community-wide Show Me Israel mission. My wife, Madeleine, and I are looking forward to this one-of-a-kind trip and invite you to join us on what is sure to be an unforgettable Israel experience. See page 3 for more details.

## FROM OUR CEO, Andrew Rehfeld, Ph.D.



I have just returned from Paris where I attended the Board of Governor's meeting of the Jewish Agency for Israel (JAFI). JAFI is one of three overseas agencies the Jewish Federation of St. Louis funds. Thanks to giving from you and our community to the Annual Campaign, this year our community will be providing about \$2 million in both unrestricted and program specific grants to our overseas partners.

JAFI's mission has traditionally been to facilitate immigration and absorption of new immigrants into Israel. In this role, it has been working closely with the Jewish community of Paris as the number of Jews from the city who are immigrating has recently increased due to the significant rise of anti-Semitism in Paris and throughout

Europe. Because of JAFI's close working relationship with local communities, they, along with the Joint Distribution Committee (JDC), are often our "boots on the ground" to help us assess the needs of distressed communities.

Prior to the meeting, I also attended a small three day pre-conference with other Federation executives from around North America. We met with high level community leaders and government officials to assess the state of the Jewish communities in Paris and throughout Europe. This is a very sensitive time for European Jews and there is a great deal of concern. JAFI continues to be an important partner of the St. Louis Jewish community and their work in assessing and meeting needs is inspiring.

But times are changing. With over 85 percent of Jews now living in Israel or the United States, and another 500,000 or so in France-a relatively affluent community-JAFI's challenges are different today than what they once were. With decades of experience in resettlement in Israel, the agency has become a driver of Jewish educational programs even as they retain and use the knowledge they have gained from their rescue and relief efforts to be ready in case of a crisis.

During this trip, we joined the JAFI staff on site visits around Paris to see the work they are doing here first hand. This included visits to a Jewish day school, and another visit with the Reform community, work JAFI is doing to promote pluralism in the Jewish community.

The work that JAFI is doing must be supported so long as there are any communities in harm's way. At the same time, our community in St. Louis is facing greater needs to invest in education and community support to promote Jewish continuity and access to Jewish camping, education and experiences in Israel. We are thus exploring ways to partner with JAFI in less traditional ways so that we can continue their support, but in a manner that will align with our own needs at home. I am optimistic we will find ways of doing so very soon.

I do want to thank former Jewish Federation of St. Louis Board Chair Heschel Raskas, who was also at the JAFI meetings where he serves on its Board of Governors.

Thank you for your continued interest, investment and involvement in the Jewish Federation of St. Louis.

# **JEWISH COMMUNITY SUMMER READING CLUB**

Full STEAM Ahead: Where STEAM\* and Literacy Come Together is the theme of a collaborative effort this summer between the Brodsky Library and PJ Library. More than 150 parents and kids, ranging in age from babies through 11 years, gathered on June 16 for the first of two educational summer literacy programs. Jewish Federation of St. Louis' Kopolow building was filled with the sounds of budding engineers, artists, chemists and architects as they constructed catapults and zip lines, built skyscrapers out of recycled materials, planted terrariums, created lava lamps, transported themselves into a story, and, in what was possibly the most challenging activity of the afternoon, tried to eat their ice cream before it melted in the hot





sun. Each week, new at-home activities related to PJ Library books and other favorites are released for families to work on together and post their results to the PJ Library and Brodsky Library Facebook pages, with hashtags #BuildDesignRead, #JSTEAM and #FullSTEAMAhead. Keep an eye out for our next program on July 27, when our STEAM activities will be focused on Israeli inventions. Activities ranging from water conservation to creating a new kind of Jerusalem street art will again bring together families from across the St. Louis Jewish community. On Tuesday, September 13, nonprofit leaders are invited to participate in a full-day of Leadership Coaching Skills Training supported by Maryville University. The program is designed to introduce participants from throughout the St. Louis region to core coaching skills that deepen listening, highlight powerful questions to unlock new thinking, increase empowerment and accountability and boost successful work relationships. 

# ST. LOUIS WOMEN'S MISSION TO ISRAEL: LEARNING ... LEADING ... COMMUNITY

Jewish Federation of St. Louis and AISH HaTorah of St. Louis are traveling to Israel as part of the Jewish Women's Renaissance Project (JWRP) St. Louis Women's Mission. JWRP was established in 2008 by eight diverse women in the Washington D.C. area who saw a deep need to create an inspiring values driven trip to Israel that will empower women to change the world.

This is AISH's seventh year bringing women on this trip and the first year for the Jewish Federation of St. Louis, thanks to the generosity of the Staenberg Family Foundation. This inaugural partnership trip allows the Jewish Federation of St. Louis and AISH the opportunity to bring women together to experience Israel with a focus on learning, leading and community. Through the JWRP Israel curriculum, they will learn Jewish values that elevate their leadership.

The St. Louis participants will arrive in Israel early to spend their first day visiting sites and learning about programs that the Jewish Federation of St. Louis helps support. They will visit Orr Shalom, a foster and group home care for Israel's most vulnerable children, they will hear from a director at Hand in Hand, a center for Jewish-Arab Education in Israel and will visit Leket Israel, the country's largest food bank where the participants will have the opportunity to package and prepare much needed food parcels. Before meeting up with the rest of the JWRP group, the St. Louis women will make a stop in our Partnership city of Yokneam to join with Israeli participants.
